I'd never been there before and was a bit apprehensive. I wasn't sure where to park or where to go once I got there. The club offers a tennis camp, and I was hoping to get some information on it. People were playing on the outside courts, but inside the club I couldn't find anyone. I was feeling a little lost and out of place, like I didn't belong there, when I heard someone call my name.

Denying Jesus

A parent of one of our son's friends from school was there playing tennis. Someone I'm friendly with, but hadn't seen in a while. He excused himself from his game and came over. I told him I was looking into summer camp for the kids, and he said I should speak with club's tennis pro that runs the camp. The pro, this young guy about 25 years old was out on one of the courts giving a lesson. "Let me introduce you," he said.

"He looks busy, maybe I should come back later."

"No. It's okay. I know the person he's with." And so I was introduced, spoke to the tennis pro about camp for the kids, and came away from the experience feeling grateful that this acquaintance, this friend, had gone out of his way to welcome me and make me feel at home.

In a few weeks at church we will be hearing the story of how Peter acted when people asked him if he was one of Jesus' disciples. After Jesus was arrested the disciples were afraid. Most of them fled. They were afraid that they too would be arrested and sentenced. When a young woman asked Peter if he was one of Jesus' disciples, he denied it. Not once, but three times he said he wasn't a follower of Jesus. Peter went so far as to say he didn't even know Jesus.

Do we ever do this? Do we ever deny Jesus?

I saw a post on the internet recently that listed "100 Ways We Deny Christ."

- We seek friendships with those mainly like ourselves.
- We fail to walk alongside others who are suffering.
- We don't share our blessings with others.
- We hold grudges.
- We don't see others as children of God. We don't see ourselves as children of God.
- We fail to forgive others (and ourselves).
- We fail to pray.
- We walk by people in need.
- We don't invite our neighbors to church.

We don't read the Bible regularly.

These are a sampling of the ways that were listed. There are others.

The great American preacher Fred Craddock gave a sermon once where he described how as a child he learned about the Christian martyrs. How some of them gave their lives in the Coliseum instead of denouncing their faith. Craddock said he would imagine himself in similar situations, brought by soldiers before a magistrate and commanded to denounce Jesus. In his imagination Craddock would boldly proclaim his faith.

As a teenager his faith was strong. He was ready for a dramatic encounter like this. But instead, Craddock lamented, that what he got was a slow day-by-day challenge to his faith. He was challenged by things not life threatening, but threatening to his pride, to his desire for security, to his desire to be liked. Challenges, it turns out, that over time were in a way much harder to withstand.

The good news for Craddock, and for us, is that even though sometimes we deny Jesus, Jesus doesn't deny us. Jesus is the one that welcomes us, when no one else will. Jesus is the one who calls out to us and invites us to follow. Jesus is the one who dusts us off, reminds us who we are, and sends us out to try again.

March's Book for ROE

The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto by Mitch Albom Readers of Emanuel will meet next on Sunday March 13th at 12pm in Jacobs' Hall.

Mitch Albom creates his most unforgettable fictional character—Frankie Presto, the greatest guitarist to ever walk the earth—in this magical novel about the bands we join in life and the power of talent to change our lives.

In his most stunning novel yet, the voice of Music narrates the tale of its most beloved disciple, young Frankie Presto, a war orphan raised by a blind music teacher in a small Spanish town. At nine years old, Frankie is sent to America in the bottom of a boat. His only possession is an old guitar and six precious strings.

But Frankie's talent is touched by the gods, and his amazing journey weaves him through

the musical landscape of the 20th century, from classical to jazz to rock and roll, with his stunning talent affecting numerous stars along the way, including Hank Williams, Elvis Presley, Carole King, Wynton Marsalis and even KISS.

Frankie becomes a pop star himself. He makes records. He is adored. But his gift is also his burden, as he realizes, through his music, he can actually affect people's futures—with one string turning blue whenever a life is altered.

At the height of his popularity, Frankie Presto vanishes. His legend grows. Only decades later, does he reappear-just before his spectacular death—to change one last life.

With its Forest Gump-like romp through the music world, The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto is a classic in the making. A lifelong musician himself, Mitch Albom delivers a remarkable novel, infused with the message that "everyone joins a band in this life" and those connections change us all.



April's book is Do You Believe a novel by Travis Thrasher.

From the creators of the blockbuster film God's Not Dead comes a novel based on their follow-up film Do You Believe?—an inspiring, heart-stirring, and faith-affirming story about how God works in the lives of those who believe.

When Pastor Matthew Wesley encounters a homeless man on a city street in the middle of the night, he can't imagine the series of life-changing events that will result from that brief moment. But as the stories and desperate circumstances of several people—including a couple struggling to make ends meet, a soldier trying to rejoin society, a pregnant and homeless teenager, and an elderly couple still grieving the loss of their only child—intertwine and come together during one climactic night, they all must work together to overcome their struggles before all is lost.

Evocative and moving, this sweeping narrative challenges you to confront the question: Do you really believe in the power of the cross, and if so, what are you going to do about it?

Agenda and Minutes January 14, 2016

<u>Present:</u> Pastor Todd, Gwen Andersen, Pam Beck, Myron Gadoury, Beth Groleau, Bruce Johnson, Disa Johnson, Glenn Johnson, Helen Maine, Walter Phaneuf, Kathy Plante, Margaret Teehan, and Ken Wieboldt.

<u>Absent:</u> Carolyn Duprey (excused), Kris Knapp, Lee Jacobs (excused), Linda Sami (excused), Jim Schabek (excused), and Donna Sennett (excused).

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.

- 1. Opening Devotions: "Is your life going in a good, healthy direction? Why do you answer this way? How can you tell? What makes a good healthy life?
 - a. How can we tell if Emanuel is going in a good, healthy direction?
 - b. Read the Bible from Galatians about the fruits of the Spirit: list of the fruits of the Spirit...
- 2. Pastor's Sabbatical answers and questions Pastor Kohl
 - a. Pastor Kohl learned 10 years that he can retire... meaning that he found he had a life outside of being pastor. People at Pilgrim had to serve, and they learned that they could do things.
 - b. The Congregation prepared by talking to each other about sabbatical and what it was for. They went to a restaurant to talk, and walked together because pilgrimage was a theme of his sabbatical. He walked part of the Camino, visited France to read and spend time on the beach with his wife. Then he went to visit a community in France to find out about it. They went to eastern Germany to visit friends --- where he ended up in hospital for 11 days while Mrs. Kohl stayed with the friends.
 - c. Pastor Kohl reported that a sabbatical is not good only for the pastor, but for the congregation.
 - d. He got \$38,000 from Lilly to prepare to go, to support the community, and to help him to go and get renewed.
 - e. How did the congregation do? Well, they had a send off before he left to talk about hopes, and another event when he got back to talk about how they all did and what they experienced during the sabbatical.
 - f. Prepared congregation to ask "How do we tell our story? What about the life of the congregation?" People learned about how to do visitations ... including to hospitals...
 - g. The church is larger than the congregation.
 - Pastoral coverage was provided by interns and other supply pastors in the area. Church income stayed about the same while Pastor Kohl was gone. Maybe more people came because they were curious about how things were going.
 - i. Whole process probably took about a year all together to prepare before Pastor Kohl left on Sabbatical.

- j. <u>Next steps:</u> Get a committee to help write the application --- Pastor Todd asked for volunteers
- 3. Approve December Minutes Approved as written.
- 4. Approve December Budget, review 2015 Budget Approved

We had no unpaid bills at the end of the year and we paid ourselves back for 2015, mostly paid back because of the money donated by the bazaar committee. We wrote off the money we borrowed from ourselves in 2014.

- 5. Review, finalize 2016 Proposed Budget
 - a. Budget is as we discussed it in December. It is relatively flat.
 - b. Myron suggested raising the Administrative Assistant to \$15 an hour for a total of \$2,263.04 more for the budget.
 - c. Discussion centered on these questions:
 - i. What do people in similar positions get paid?
 - ii. How many days do we want someone present in the church office? Which days are most important? Suggested Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays.
 - iii. Would asking volunteers to cover other days be helpful?
 - iv. Alternative ideas...
 - d. Motion made and seconded to go to \$15 an hour for sixteen hours a week. Approved 7 to 6.
- 6. Annual Meeting:
 - a. Ken and Helen will organize lunch before the meeting as required by the constitution. Helen got a Thrivent Action Team for food and supplies.
 - b. We need someone to take the notes for the Annual Meeting. We will ask for help .
 - c. Ask that reports are in the order they are presented in the Agenda.
 - d. Council for 2016 : Linda Sami is resigning to be the Christian Education Committee's chair. Shannon Schabek and Lois May would like to join the Council. Kris Knapp and Jim Schabek will be leaving the council.
- 7. Other
 - a. Custodians: Myron
 - i. Custodian Liz Redin is still out from a car accident; will return when she is able.
 - ii. Friday custodian did not come to work or call Myron; the person cannot work Saturdays so will move to be a substitute when needed; Tyler Hayes has been hired to work on Saturday.
 - b. Disa Thinking about what happened to Joan Mendes Could we find a way for us to help people who are elderly and live alone be checked daily so no one else falls and is not discovered for several days?

- c. Pastor Todd: Real Good Church by Molly Phinney Baskette: Would Council agree to read a chapter a month and discuss as part of Council meetings?
- d. Synod Workshop at with Bishop Hazelwood Pilgrim April 23 "Generating Generous Giving" at 9 AM Arrival – 3:30: Hopefully a few people from Emanuel will go.
- e. Scandinavian Women's concert a t 3 p.m. Saturday \$5.00
- f. Annual Meeting: encourage all council members to be there.
- g. Helen asked about a plan to cover window wells to prevent water and leaves from filling them, and sump pumps incase the basement gets flooded. We learned that there have been no problems since road was repaired and there is a berm to prevent water from flowing from the street into the back of the church property. The water flows down the hill across the parking lot. We already have sump pumps that are in storage until they are needed.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer at 9:00 p.m.
