He's a leader in the Southern Baptist Convention and for years gave interviews giving the news media the "evangelical" perspective on a wide variety of issues. What caught my attention in this most recent interview was that Moore said he no longer refers to himself as an "evangelical". The term has become "confused," he said. More and more people today are identifying themselves as evangelicals regardless of their beliefs about Jesus or the Bible.

Are You an Evangelical?

During the last century the term "evangelical" came to be associated with Christians who emphasized the infallibility of the Bible, a personal conversion experience, and the end-times – including belief in the rapture*. But in more recent times, the term "evangelical" has come to mean simply – any conservative Christian. This obscuring of the definition has Moore distancing himself from the term, but the word "evangelical" has an even longer history and originally was associated with a different meaning.

The word "evangelical" comes from the biblical Greek word $\dot{\epsilon}\dot{u}a\gamma\gamma\dot{\epsilon}\lambda io\nu$, which means roughly "messenger of good news". The word "angel" also comes from this same root. So, an evangelical is a messenger of good news. Does this describe you – a messenger of good news?

Traditionally for Christians this good news has center around what was revealed about God in Jesus. Namely that God loves us, claims us as God's children and is willing to go to extreme lengths so we might know this love forever. This is the good news revealed in the New Testament. Individually, however, we may experience the good news of God in many different ways: in a glimmer of hope in the midst of depression, in a helping hand when we need it the most, in knowing that we are not alone while sitting with a loved one that's dying. When we share these moments of hope, grace and love with others, we are being evangelical. Lutherans have a long history of being evangelical. In fact, before Martin Luther and his followers got stuck with the label "Lutherans" they referred to themselves as the "Evangelicals". They saw themselves as messengers of the good news Luther had rediscovered in the Bible – that we are saved *not* by appeasing an angry God by doing more and more good works, but we are saved by God's grace – simply because God loves us and chooses to forgive our sins. In this we are set free to love one another and to share this great news.

In many ways we are called to be evangelicals. The national church we belong to is the **Evangelical** Lutheran Church of America. Emanuel's official name, as listed in our constitution, is Emanuel **Evangelical** Lutheran Church. And Jesus even calls us to be evangelical.

Jesus gave his disciples, including us, what is referred to as the great commission. He told them to go out and baptize every nation in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19). He told them to go out and share the good news. People often think the purpose of this evangelism is to expand God's kingdom, but equally important, I believe, is the benefit sharing the gospel has on the messenger. When we share a story of God's grace, love and forgiveness – we get to relive that experience – and get to experience God's grace, love and forgiveness all over again.

So, let us reclaim this word "evangelical". Let us share with others our experience of the good news – in theological terms, in the stories we tell, and most importantly in the lives we live.

*The rapture refers to the idea that Jesus will come again and whisk believers up to heaven before the great tribulation and years before he comes finally at the end of time. The idea of the rapture is a relatively new concept. John Nelson Darby first proposed it in the 1830's as part of his dispensationalism theology, which was a departure from the traditional belief that Jesus will come again just once at the end of time "to judge the quick and the dead." The rapture and dispensationalism have been popularized in recent times in The Left Behind book series.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m.

- I. Opening Devotions based on book discussion
 - a. Positive signs

- i. Floors in Jacobs Hall and in the fellowship hall

- v. When lights are out or too dim... (we also know that Property Committee works on that all the time)

- ix. Shortcomings in communication --- This affects many programs and procedures at Emanuel and causes misunderstandings, confusion, and negative reactions to changes. Clear communications <u>before changes</u> are made will probably reduce resistance to some changes and will help people to welcome other

new proposals and plans.

- II. Book Discussion continued:
 - a. Could we get someone (or more than one person) who has not been here before to come in and find their way and try to negotiate the worship service?

- a. Beth will send out Carol's report in the future when she receives it from Carol.
- b. Council members are asked to review it carefully before they come to the meeting.
- V. Discuss heating system repair costs Glenn
 - a. We have spent about \$3600 on heating repairs when we have new boilers since 2012, almost as much as we pay for the gas. New boilers are high efficiency to lower carbon emissions to the atmosphere. We have a maintenance contract on them. Myron explained what the property committee has done. Big expense was that a blower blew. Since they are new, we cannot predict what will happen and require maintenance. A couple of times, Joyful called for service because they had no hot water, but it turned out that Joyful hadn't run the water long enough. Are there "instant hot water systems" that we could put in at each sink? That would cost a lot more.
 - b. We do need to be aware of the problem because it is affecting the budget.
- VI. Offering Counter Instruction Sheet Glenn

Bob Maine updated the sheet. We also need more counters. Let Glenn Johnson know if we can help. Change name to "Counters Job Instructions." That way it is easier to update and doesn't need to be part of the Constitution or Bylaws.

 - a. At no cost to the church, we can get free hard copies, and either a PDF or an app. Appointments for family photos are on September 15,16,17 (Friday, Saturday, and Sunday).
