Do BLACK LIVES MATTER at Emanuel?

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Back in early July Jill and I visited our old neighborhood in Somerville, MA. We stopped at our favorite pizza place (Angelina's), and I also dragged Jill along for a pilgrimage to First Church Somerville.

Last year the council read a book called "Real Good Church" written by the pastor of First Church. The book talked a lot about the creative things they did as a congregation, and I wanted to check it out. The book is subtitled "How Our Church Came Back from the Dead, and Yours Can, Too."

After wandering down a side street off of Davis Square, we eventually found First Church. It was unspectacular. The grounds were a mess. I think because of some sort of construction project that was underway. And no one was around – no one at all. Granted it was a hot summer afternoon. However, one thing caught my attention. It was a gigantic sign hanging on their steeple with the words "BLACK LIVES MATTER" on it.

These words seem to have special powers. They can stir people up. I remember a while back reading a rant from one of my friends on Facebook who was quite disturbed by these words. "No. No!" they said, "It should be 'All Lives Matter.' It's not just black lives that matter. All lives matter."

And of course they are right. All lives do matter: yellow, brown, red, white, etc. However, I don't think that's really the question. The question is whether or not *black* lives matter. After all, it's people with *black* skin that are being shot, and killed, and profiled, and incarcerated in disproportionate numbers, not *all* people. Given the evidence, it's not clear that black lives really do matter.

First Church Somerville is a progressive church, but seeing their big "BLACK LIVES MATTER" sign surprised me. It seemed a bit dated. It had been while since I remembered hearing of a black person being shot and killed by the police (It turns out that it hadn't been that long. On April 29th 15 year old Jordan Edwards was killed by a white police officer in Balch Springs, TX). But then a few weeks later groups of Neo Nazis, the KKK, and white nationalists decided to hold a "United the Right" rally in Charlottesville, VA. There they clashed with counter protesters including Christian pastors and laypeople and members of the Black Lives Matter movement. One person, Heather Heyer, died when a Neo Nazi drove his car into a crowd of counter protesters. In the wake of these events I remembered First Church's big sign hanging out for everyone in the community to see. It got me wondering if Emanuel should hang up a similar big sign, and how we as a congregation feel about recent events and not-so-recent events.

Do BLACK LIVES MATTER at Emanuel? On an average Sunday you don't see many (or any) people of color at Emanuel. Who would feel more welcome coming to worship at Emanuel, a person with black skin OR a white nationalist? Aside from our welcome statement, there's not much evidence that black lives do matter at Emanuel.

But Emanuel is not alone in this. A couple of years ago the Pew Research Center did a study on the diversity of religious groups in the United States. Out of the 30 groups studied the second least diverse group was the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. We're 96% white. And for me this lack of diversity is not isolated to church. When I look around my neighborhood or even at my Facebook friends, what I see is mostly other white people.

Why is this? I'm not a racist. I like people of color and over the course of my life have been good friends with a few. And yet somehow my life has turned out to look like a white nationalist's dream. How did this happen?

I believe the problem started a long time ago and has to do with the history of our country. Originally only white people could be citizens of the United States. And only citizens could vote, serve on juries, hold office, and in some cases, even own property. Black people, on the other hand, were bought and sold as slaves. White people profited from 200 years of slave labor. Black people were set free after the Emancipation Proclamation and began their new lives with just the clothes on their backs. Then Jim Crow laws, passed in the late 1800's and early 1900's, setup a system where almost exclusively the best jobs, neighborhoods, schools and hospitals served and were reserved for white people.

More recently, in the 1930's as part of Roosevelt's New Deal, the Federal Housing Administration was created with the goal of making it possible for middle class Americans to own their own home. Today this is still part of the American Dream. The Federal Housing Administration backed the mortgages of millions of Americans. However, to qualify you had to be white. Mortgages to black families were considered too risky and were not backed. Through this program millions of average white Americans became homeowners for the first time, and white-only suburbs were created.

Further Government decisions about where to locate freeways, waste treatment plants, and other things that disrupt neighborhoods usually favored white neighborhoods over black. The result is that homes in white neighborhoods increased in value more than black or integrated neighborhoods. And the value of these homes has gotten passed down to subsequent generations.

There's been a history of privilege for white people, that has allowed them to accumulate wealth over generations and pass it down to us today. Similarly there's also been a history of hindrance for black people, that has been passed down to black people today. The result is neighborhoods and churches full of white people.

Emanuel's history as a Swedish immigrant church still has a big influence on us today: our style of worship, and on the color of our skin. Perhaps the reason we are a mostly white church is that black people just prefer to worship in a different style. Maybe black people just don't like German Chorales. Or perhaps people in general would just rather be with people who look like themselves and have similar backgrounds. There are many churches that primarily black. In fact, the least diverse church in that Pew study was the National Baptist Convention. They are 99% black.

Does this mean the white nationalists are right – that we'd all be happier if we were separated by race? No. The National Baptist Convention comes out of the same history of slavery, Jim Crow laws, and housing discrimination that the rest of America's segregated churches come from.

The kingdom of God that Jesus proclaimed is one that continually broke barriers and reached out to include people who were different: Samaritans, Syrophenicians, Greeks, Romans, Ethiopians, eunuchs, lepers, women, rich, poor, etc. As the Apostle Paul wrote, "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

Our white churches, and neighborhoods, and friends are the product of a history of racist practices. In the past people setup laws and actively worked and to separate races. Fear and mistrust have been used. But the Bible tells us again and again – do not be afraid, God is with us. Today we need to actively work to build trust and integrate races. The laws we pass and the policies we implement should help repair the damage of the past. Our daily choices – of who to sit next to, and say hello to, and invite over for dinner – should reach across the illusionary barriers of race.

In God's kingdom we are all children of God together. This was what Jesus proclaimed and worked for, it was the dream of Martin Luther King, and now it is our daily work.


